# Weather: What's in Store for 2014

With this year's crops safely stored away, many farmers are thinking of the past two planting seasons and wondering what's in store for 2014. World Weather, Inc.'s Senior Agricultural Meteorologist Drew Lerner will provide some insight about that question when he speaks at the Northern Soybean Expo on February 18 in Fargo.

Lerner says that we're in an 18-year weather cycle. "This cycle is the reason for the cold surges we keep getting across the middle of the country. This isn't going away anytime soon. It's actually going to linger

into early spring, so it may give us a little bit of a delay in the start of spring fieldwork across part of the Midwest. The Northern Plains may not be impacted quite as significantly as the heart of the Midwest. The soil temperatures will be fairly cold, so we'll need to warm up fairly quickly when we get into the key planting dates."

Lerner says we're looking at the potential for an El Nino to develop. "This is only a potential. We have to be careful about how much we buy into it right now. The models don't do well beyond about five months. Right now, they suggest than an El Nino may evolve. If it does, it will help generate greater precipitation across part of the Midwest during the summer season. Not every El Nino behaves the same as previous ones, and it does have to

interact with other weather patterns."

Lerner also sees a possible dry pattern for the middle of the country. "That feature has promoted the drought in the Southern Plains for the last three years. There will be an influence on the Northern Plains and all the Midwest from this prevailing pattern."


"The bottom line is there's a lot to look at yet. We're beginning to get the picture. I think we have some confidence that this spring we'll be cooler to begin with, especially in the eastern portions of the Dakotas, Minnesota and all the way down into the heart of the Midwest."

# How Your World Works

Where will the soybean industry be in five years? How about 15 years? Peter Zeihan, a geopolitical strategist and forecaster will give growers "an accurate view of the world" at the Northern Soybean Expo Feb. 18 in Fargo.

For the past 12 years, Zeihan has worked in various local and international governmental positions. He distills economics, demographics, history and culture into actionable items so audience members will have a clear concept of what cannot happen, what must happen eventually and what will happen very soon.

In his comments, Zeihan will look at how free trade, changing capital availability and the energy revolution will mean a new way to operate in the soybean industry. "I want growers

to have good, reliable indicators of where the

industry is actually going and the options that will be available.

"I want to leave growers with an idea of the world that will actually unfold versus what they see in the media," Zeihan explains. "We'll look at the real trends operating behind the scenes, not the day-today ups and downs. I won't tell growers what to do, but rather what is and what has to be."

# What Could Possibly Go Right? Agriculture is Doomed...or Maybe Not

The prospect of lower prices and higher input costs has brought out the purveyors of doom and gloom. Many commentators have said the party is over, but John Phipps is not one of them.

"We are underestimating the capability of the people of agriculture to handle what is simply part of the routine business cycle," said Phipps, one of the speakers at the Northern Soybean Expo. "For some reason, it's thought we no longer have the capability to handle anything but the very best of times, and that is just nonsense." Phipps hosts U.S. Farm Report and is a columnist for the Farm Journal and Top Producer magazines. Phipps farms in Illinois and is now bringing one of his sons into the operation.

The current market downturn has been compared to the farm crisis days of the 1980s. Phipps disagrees, saying the farm-equity situation is quite different. In addition, today's farmers are also better prepared.

"They are reading the Wall Street Journal and Barron's, and are able to comprehend both national and global

economic trends better than ever before. We are prepared for pretty much any kind of future that can come toward us, and I do not share the rampant pessimism that hard times are going to result in years of misery just because we don't have \$8 corn and \$18 soybeans."

Phipps also believes the enthusiasm and ambition found within the younger generation of farmers will benefit the entire industry. In his view, the Millennial generation and the Gen X/ Gen Y crowd are more flexible and can adapt to the changing market environment.

A positive attitude can also impact the farm business, regardless of the latest market report. "The business cycle has very little to do with if you are happy on the farm or not," said Phipps.

During Expo's buffet breakfast on February 18th, various NDSU soybean production researchers will be available to discuss and answer producers' questions on soybean research and 2014 production issues. Researchers will be on hand to provide current soybean production research information that can help producers with planting and management



decisions for the 2014 growing season.

In FY 2014, the North Dakota Soybean Council (NDSC) is funding \$1.8 million in soybean production research, which is approximately 33% of NDSC's budget. Copies of NDSU's "Soybean Production Field Guide" and NDSC's "2013 Research Update" will also be available during breakfast. Buffet breakfast is from 8:00 a.m. to 9:45 a.m., so plan to come early!

# ASA Chairman Part of Northern Soybean Expo

Canton, Miss., farmer Danny Murphy, the current Chairman of the American Soybean Association, says that he is anxious to meet North Dakota soybean growers and see what their priorities are. "Probably No. 1 on that list is to listen and to see how ASA can assist North Dakota and North Dakota growers," says Murphy, one of the speakers at the Northern Soybean Expo in Fargo on February 18th.

Murphy farms in the hills of central Mississippi, north of Jackson, raising corn and soybeans. "Cotton had been the mainstay of the farm since my grandfather moved here in 1944," says Murphy. "We'd always grown cotton up until 2007. I planted a few hundred acres in 2011 and 2012; then, I got back out again,



and I think I'm out for good now."

Murphy is not alone with his switch from cotton to corn. Mississippi went from 1.3 million acres of cotton in 2006 to about 300,000 today. Murphy says the state probably would have planted a million acres of corn in 2013 if it hadn't been so wet. Why the big switch from cotton? "Cotton prices had been so low for so long," says Murphy, "plus we got reniform nematode in the cotton, and corn was an excellent rotation crop for that (pest). So that really started the corn trend, and everybody found out we could grow corn better down here than we thought we could. In fact, our state average this year was like 182 bushels to the acre, so it's really amazing when you think about that kind of average for a southern state."

Murphy farms about 40 miles from the Delta. Most

of his land has two to four percent slope. His annual rainfall is about 55 inches; most of his fields are small, and it's all dryland farming. The big advantage in the Delta is having water for irrigation.

Following the long battle to pass a new farm bill, Murphy says that there is reason to question how Congress views agriculture's relevance and whether the lawmakers will continue to ignore farmers. "I think that's really up to commodity groups, such as soybeans, corn, cotton, rice, cattle, pork, poultry-all of our commodity groups," says Murphy. "We really need to make sure that we are united, that we get our message clear and that we do a better job of making sure that Congress understands the value that agriculture brings."

# TAKE ACTION AGAINST HERBICIDE-RESISTANT WEEDS.

I will know my weeds. When they grow. When they pollinate. And I will stop them before they go to seed.
